

## Overview of ELA and Social Studies Learning at the Institute:

- Welcome to the 2016 Summer Institute! Over the course of the next two weeks, you will learn how technology can be integrated into interdisciplinary lessons and units. There is one comprehensive assignment that you will complete that will demonstrate your understanding of this process. This assignment requires you to create an interdisciplinary unit that addresses a social studies topic that also includes Language Arts and technology components. Your goal is to create a unit that you and your mentor teacher can actually implement this coming fall. You will be provided with additional details about the unit on the first day of the institute.

- In order to prepare, I would suggest that you read the information provided in the two links posted below. They will give you an overview of the backward design method that you will use to plan your unit. You will also want to touch base with your mentor teacher and ask about the social studies and language arts curriculum that you will be teaching in the fall. I would suggest requesting access to the pacing guides for your grade level, if possible. You might also ask your mentor teacher to bring the reading and social studies teacher editions to the institute.
