# LASTINGER CENTER for LEARNING

The Lastinger Center for Learning, part of the University of Florida College of Education, is an innovative school-improvement program created to increase student achievement in high-poverty elementary schools around the state. Through hands-on training, UF professors partner with teachers and principals to improve the quality of teaching, learning, leadership and parental involvement.

The Lastinger Center has created the Florida Flagship Schools network to reach out to 18 at-risk schools in Duval, Alachua, Collier and Miami-Dade counties. All of the schools have received D or F school grades at some point in the last five years. Since the Lastinger Center's involvement, almost all participating schools have seen their grades improve. Lastinger Center professors and staff actually embed themselves in the classrooms at participating schools for first-hand observation and demonstration of experimental teaching methods.



## Rigorous professional development in high-poverty schools

The Center works with elementary schools to increase student achievement by improving educator practice. Emphasizing an inquiry-based approach, Center personnel and UF faculty members partner with teachers and principals to engage in a year-long cycle of continuous improvement that focuses on collaborative assessment of student work, analysis of teaching dilemmas, lesson study and action research.

Teachers and principals from flagship schools each have their own networking groups that meet regularly during the year–including at annual, UF-hosted summer institutes.

## Job-embedded, practice-based master's degree program

The Lastinger Center seeks to develop and retain master teachers in underresourced schools by bringing a job-embedded graduate program to teachers in their schools. Teachers study research-based best practices in their courses and then receive coaching and mentoring to immediately implement those practices in their classrooms. Participants receive a full-tuition scholarship in return for a fiveyear commitment to teach in a high-poverty school. This novel program not only increases the knowledge and skills of teachers in these challenging schools, but helps to transform these sites into learning communities, where learning is the focus for children and adults alike.
